I am honoured to be with you tonight representing the Honourable Campbell Newman, Premier of Queensland, and the Honourable Glen Elmes MP, Minister for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and Multicultural Affairs and Minister Assisting the Premier, who were unable to attend and extend their apologies.

Europe Day is an annual celebration around two dates in May which mark the first movements towards the current European Union. On the 5th and the 9th May, this cooperation of nations was ratified through the establishment of the Council of Europe, and the Schuman Declaration respectively.

Namesake, and then the French Foreign Minister, Robert Schuman, had the vision of creating an institution that would pool and manage coal and steel production; today this institution represents the largest world economy and the first global development aid donor.

In Australia, much of our social, economic and cultural development can be attributed to our strong relations with, the migration of people, from all over the world, including Europe.

In fact, according to the 2011 Australian Census, approximately 340,000 Queenslanders reported being born in Europe, and more than three million claim to have a European heritage.
