
March 9 Friday 6:00 pm Live Concert

But his lies are so complicated that he gets entangled in his own ropes and in the end is no longer even sure what he wants to achieve.

The Hungarian Revolution of 1848 was one of many revolutions that year and closely linked to other revolutions of 1848 in the Habsburg areas. The revolution in the Kingdom of Hungary grew into a war for independence from Habsburg rule. Many of its leaders and participants, including Lajos Kossuth, István Széchenyi, Sándor Petőfi, József Bem, are among the most respected national figures in Hungarian history, and the anniversary of the revolution's outbreak, on March 15, is one of Hungary's national holidays.


JUST SEX AND NOTHING ELSE (CSAK SZEX ÉS MÁS SEMMI) Feature film, directed by Krisztina Goda (2005), colour, duration: 90 minutes

What is an attractive, thirty something woman to do who is fed up with dating but is desperate to have a child? This dilemma is certainly shared by many single women of Dóra generation in big cities all over the world. Dóra (Judit Schell), a dramaturge at a Budapest theatre has had it with men after she finds out that her fiancé is married. Listening to her biological clock, Dóra decides to get pregnant through a no-strings-attached affair. She tries Internet dating, and there is no shortage of candidates in her immediate environment, either, including Ali, the handsome, bubbly counterboy from the neighbourhood Turkish deli; Péter, the charming but gawky composer; and Tamás, the dashing star of the theatre new production.

Called a "serious farce" by a prominent U.S. film critic, Just Sex... was a huge hit in Hungary, winning Best Screenplay at the Hungarian Film Week, and its funny situations, excellent performances (Tamás is played by award-winning Sándor Csányi, star of the popular "Kontroll") and witty dialogue have received enthusiastic response and sold-out showings at international film festivals.

MYSTICAL RAPTURE Tanjore paintings by Priya Renganathan

Tanjore Painting is an important form of classical painting, native to the South Indian town of Thanjavur (anglicized as Tanjore) in Tamil Nadu. The art form dates back to 1600 AD, a period when the Nayakas of Tanjavur encouraged art. One can find traditional Tanjore paintings of Hindu deities made with gold, diamonds and other precious gems, adorning the walls of the palaces and temples of India, and the puja rooms of the rich. Mystical Rapture depicts the energy of various mythologies and religions fused with the traditional Tanjore style of representation - with 24-carat gold, rubies, coral, garnet, pearls and Jaipur stones.

SOBRI Feature film, directed by Emil Novák (2002), colour, duration: 87 minutes

A romantic story of a highwayman. Jóska Sobri, or Zsubri, as he was known by the Transdanubian people, is a famous figure of the romantic world of highwaymen in Hungary, and was a legendary highwayman in the Bakony Mountains in the 1830s. The film combines the historically accurate, real story of Sobri with legend. The story has two main plotlines: on the one hand it follows the adventures of Sobri's gang, and on the other hand it tells the love story of Jóska Sobri and Rozi Répa. The script is based on stories, tales, and folk songs created by the people and spread from mouth to mouth, as well as on their literary adaptations. Besides Sobri's adventures and love story the film also portrays the world of the 1830s with nature, Lake Balaton, and the magnificent landscapes of the Bakony playing an important role in its cinematography.
