Visa facilitation for citizens of the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia











Easier travel to the EU becomes a real ity for the citizens of the former Yugo slav Republic of Macedonia-this is what the visa facilitation agreement between the EU and the former Yugoslav Republic

of Macedonia stands for. The purpose of the new visa regime is to facilitate the issuance of hort-stay visas to persons who hold the nationality of this country. This should make the European perspective of the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia more tangible to its citizens. Visa facilitation is a first concrete step towards the visa free travel regime.

The visa facilitation agreement has advantages for all nationals of the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedo nia travelling to the EU in the form of a low visa fee rate $(35 \in \text{instead})$ of the generally applicable rate of $60 \in \text{instead}$ and speedier handling of visa applications (maximum

10 days as a main rule). It has also advantages for broad groups in the form of simplified document requirements for the purpose of the journey and clear rules on when multiple entry visas can be granted. For certain categories of people such as students and pensioners visas will be given free of charge.

This brochure provides basic information for interest ed applicants about the rules and principles for issuing short-stay visas. EU Member States will take steps to en sure that all existing arrangements are in line with the letter and the spirit of the visa facilitation agreements and should make additional detailed information available on the web sites of their consular services. Additional information can also be found on the web sites of the EC Delegation in Skopje and of the government of the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia.

1. Short-stay visa

- Do you intend to stay in an EU Member State or in several EU Member States fore than 90 days per period of 180 days?
- Do you intend to transit through the territory of one or several EU Member States?

Then, you need a**short-stay visa**, which means an authorization issued by an EU Member State for you to stay in or transit through this country or several Member States.

Important information

The new visa facilitation rules apply to all EU member states are encouraged to conclude separate agreements with similar content as the EU agreement. There is also a need for separate agreements with Norway and Iceland.

Where to apply?

- You can apply for a visa to the consular services of the EU member state where you intend to make a short stay.
- For a short stay in more than one EU member state, you need to address yourself to the consulate of the main destination country.
- In case it is difficult to determine the main destination, you should go to the consulate of the first entry into the Schengen area.

What are the minimum requirements to apply for a visa? – You must:

- Complete and sign a visa application form.
- Present a passport which will be valid at least three months after the visa requested is due to expire.
- Specify the means of transport you intend to use.
- Demonstrate sufficient means of subsistence for your journey and for the return trip.
- Demonstrate that you have a health insurance valid for the trip.
- Describe the purpose and circumstances of your visit.



The new visa facilitation rules concern this last point:

The examples listed hereafter give a number of case studies for your orientation. Please note that this list is given for your guidance only and is not meant to be exhaustive. If you belong to one of the following cat egories, only the document(s) listed below can be re quested for justifying the purpose of your journey; no


other justification, invitation or validation is required. However, all other requirements necessary for ob taining a visa such as presenting documents on your means of subsistence remain unchanged and need to be checked with the consulate where you intend to ap ply for a visa.

... then you have to justify the purpose of your journey by presenting:

... a written request from a host legal person or com pany or public authority.

- ... a written request from the host organisation.
- ... a written request or certificate of enrolment from the host university, college or school.
- ...a written request from the host organisation.

... a written request from the relative you intend to visit.

- ... an official document of the medical institution and proof of sufficient financial means to pay for the medical treatment.
- ...a certificate or voucher from a travel agency or a tour operator.
- ... an official document confirming the fact of death, as well as confirmation of the family or other relationship.

Important information

Please note that EU or national law continue to apply to all issues that are not covered by the visa facilitation agree ments, such as: the refusal to issue a visa, recognition of travel documents, the general requirement to appear personally if submitting a visa application, the possibility in case of doubts to invite applicants for a personal inter view in individual cases, the refusal of entry and expulsion measures but also the existing flexibilities for bona fide travelers.

2. Multiple-entry short-stay visa

A multiple-entry short stay visa to the EU shall be issued to you, valid up to one yeaif,

- · during the previous year you have obtained at least one visa
- · you have made use of it in accordance with the laws on entry and stay of the visited EU Member State
- you regularly travel to EU Member States and are a:
 - · business person
 - member of the professions participating ininternational exhibitions, conferences, symposia, seminars or other similar events
 - person needing to visit regularly fomedical reasons or necessary accompanying person
 - person regularly participating iscientific, cultural, sports or artistic activities
 - student who regularly travels for the purposes of study or educational training



A multiple-entry short-stay visa to the EU shall be issued to you, valid for a minimum of 2 years and a maximum of 5 years, if


- · you belong to one of the categories of persons above,
- during the previous year you have made use of the one-year multiple-entry visa in ac cordance with the laws on entry and stay of the visited EU Member State and
- the reasons for requesting a multiple-entry visa are still valid.





3. How much do you need to pay for your short-stay visa application?

The fee for processing your visa application amounts to **35 euro**. This fee concerns both single and multiple-entry visas.



The following categories of persons benefit from charge-free visa:

- · Close relatives.
- Persons who have presented documents proving the necessity of their travel or documents arounds, including to receiveurgent medical treatment and the person accompanying such person, or to attend a funeral of a close relative or to visit a seriously ill close relative.
- · Pensioners.
- Children under 6 years of age.

- **Disabled persons** and the person accompanying them, if necessary.
- Pupils, students and accompanying teachers who undertake trips for the purposes of study or educa tional training, including in the framework of ex change programmes, as well as other school-related activities.
- Persons participating inscientific, cultural, sports and artistic activities, including university and other exchange programmes.



4. How long will the procedures for processing your visa application take?

The diplomatic mission and consular posts of the EU Member States shall take a decision on the request to issue a visawithin 10 calendar days of the date of the receipt of the application and documents required.

This period of time may be reduced to 3 working days or less in **urgent cases**. It may be extended to up to 30 calendar days in individual cases, in particular when further scrutiny of the application is needed.
