Thousands denounce sanctions

The Saturday Herald, May 14, 2011

Thousands of people gathered at Mount Carmel School in Headlands yesterday to show their opposition to the Western-imposed illegal sanctions regime.

The rally came at a time when the Government has announced that the target of 2 million signatures had already been surpassed. Cde Shamu told the rally that elections will be held this year as they are the only way to end the inclusive Government.

GPA saved Zim from tougher EU Sanctions

Zanu PF declares bloody June 27

Zanu PF yesterday declared that there is no going back on elections and whether it "runs alone or not."

Party spokesman Rugare Gumbo said other political parties are free not to participate in the polls but once President Robert Mugabe proclaims the date they will go ahead. He added that the inclusive Government has had its life span so elections should now be held.

Keep out of schools, politicians told

The Apex Council has urged political parties to desist from using schools as campaign grounds as this compromised the country's education system and instilled fear among teachers and pupils. The remarks follow reports that several schools in Headlands, Manicaland province were closed last week and pupils and teachers ordered to attend a Zanu PF rally at Mt Carmel School. Zanu PF has taken its anti-sanctions to schools and allegations are that teachers and students were being forced to sign the petition.

Election roadmap hijacked

The United States and Britain have joined forces in attempts to hijack the roadmap to Zimbabwe's election, with US Deputy Assistant Secretary of State Ms Susan Page and her UK counterpart, Junior Foreign Minister David Howell, being the point officials spearheading the plot aimed at blocking the holding of elections this year, it emerged.

US denies influencing election timing in Zim

SADC in turmoil

As Tsvangirai, Ncube not yet invited to Summit

There are fears that Zimbabwe might not be on the agenda of the SADC Summit scheduled for Friday as South African President Jacob Zuma's availability is in doubt amid reports that he is involved in his country's local Government polls; moreover media reports indicate that MDC-T leader Morgan Tsvangirai and Welshman Ncube of the other MDC faction have not yet been invited to the Summit.

Khaya Moyo meets German MPs

Liebich said Germany would act on sanctions only after the completion of the constitution-making process and what he termed the delivery of "credible elections." Germany was perceived to be softening when it comes to the stance taken by the EU on Zimbabwe.

Security reforms rejected

The MDC formations have accused the security forces of being partisan and pro-Zanu PF.

Human Rights Issues

Rights Commission to look only at post-2009 abuses

The proposed Zimbabwe Human Rights Commission will only deal with cases that happened after the formation of the Inclusive Government in 2009. The Human Rights Commission Bill was recently approved by Cabinet. This means that cases of Gukurahundi, Operation Murambatsvina and the 2008 violence will not be addressed.

Media Issues

ZUJ slams Tsvangirai's attack on journalists

The Zimbabwe Union of Journalists (ZUJ) has slammed Prime Minister Morgan Tsvangirai's statements that journalists working for the public media are shallow for criticising him and his party. ZUJ also criticised Minister Obert Mpofu for singling out the Daily News while appearing before the Parliamentary Portfolio Committee on Mines and Energy that the paper was working with the country's detractors.

Economic Issues

Govt to amend Mines and Minerals Act

Mines and Mining Development, Minister Obert Mpofu said Government was in the process of amending the Mines and Minerals Act so that it is in sync with the country's indigenisation policy. Mpofu said the Bill would promote investment, develop new mines and further economic empowerment and indigenisation.

Upfumi Kuvadiki targets Econet

Upfumi Kuvadiki, a youth empowerment group linked to Zanu PF, on Monday stormed Econet headquarters and demanded that its members be given contracts to supply various goods to the mobile operator. The group tried to take over a South African company, Easipark, contracted to manage Harare's municipal parking earlier this year.

Germans keen to invest if property rights are respected

A delegation of German parliamentarians visiting Zimbabwe said companies from that country are keen to re-invest in Zimbabwe, but needs a firm Government commitment that property rights will be respected before re-investing. The group also expressed strong reservations against the Indigenisation law, which requires foreigners to cede 51% shares to locals.

Social Issues

Cholera looms in Harare

Harare mayor Muchadeyi Masunda says the city may be hit by a cholera outbreak as UNICEF has terminated its water treatment chemicals partnership with the city at the end of June. Masunda said the Council is not receiving any funding from the Government.
