

# DISARMAMENT, DEMOBILISATION AND REINTEGRATION OF FORMER COMBATANTS (DDR)

The EU plays a strong role in international peace processes and conflict prevention. It is a reliable partner for institutions and organisations working to alleviate human suffering and promote sustainable development, and a peace and security provider through the unique role of the civilian and military CSDP missions and operations.

### Conflicts are increasingly complex and protracted, as armed groups:



are more fragmented and active across international borders



are sometimes linked to terrorist organisations



exploit social, ethnic, cultural, economic, political, religious and security grievances

### Disarmament, demobilisation and reintegration supports:



individuals or groups who voluntarily lay down their arms and break away from armed structures to live as civilians



**communities** where former combatants and their associates (re)integrate



the transition from armed confrontation to political engagement and inclusive governance

contribute to the prevention of conflict re-occurrence

## **EXAMPLES OF EU ENGAGEMENT**



### The EU plays a fundamental role in the Colombian peace process:

- supporting the negotiations leading to the peace agreement and its implementation
- stimulates trust and dialogue between Former FARC-EP and the Government
- supporting the socio-economic and political reincorporation of former combatants, e.g. by supporting productive projects and vocational training, housing and access to public basic services



### The EU supported the DDR process in Indonesia's Aceh province:

- deploying the EU Aceh Monitoring Mission
- undertaking the decommissioning of Free Aceh Movement (GAM) armaments and the relocation of their military and police forces
- monitoring the human rights situation, the process of legislative change, and the reintegration of GAM members



#### The EU contributed to the DDR process in Côte d'Ivoire:

- complementing the government's disarmament and demobilisation efforts by focusing on reintegration efforts
- providing support to the State Building Contract, with a special focus on justice sector reform, national reconciliation and conflict prevention
- supporting civil society organisations and local authorities
