## Context

As we enter into the Decade of Action to Deliver on the Sustainable Development Goals, 2021 will be a pivotal year and our actions will determine whether we meet our target SDG 8.7 of ending child labour and all its forms by 2025. Today, of the 152 million children estimated to be victims of child labour, about 71% of them work in agriculture including fishing, forestry, livestock herding and aquaculture (ILO 2017/FAO 2020).

2021 has been designated as the International Year of the Elimination of Child Labour. It is time to re-double collective efforts, renew international commitments and scale-up actions to consign child labour into history. While the pace of progress has slowed down, and new challenges are keep occurring, the solutions are known. Therefore, commitment and resources need reinvigorating. In joining hands with our partners, we believe we can ‘Act, Inspire and Scale Up’ our efforts in giving children the future they deserve.

Sustainable agriculture, together with fisheries and aquaculture, remain the key driver for poverty eradication and sustainable development. The EU is committed to develop agricultural value chains, which benefit the poor by taking advantage of the opportunities offered by local and global markets to create decent jobs and value added. The EU considers value chains as a major channel for agriculture development from “farm to fork.”

## Objective and approach

On the occasion of Europe Day 2021, the Delegation of the European Union in Rome wishes to contribute to raising awareness on the need to eliminate child labour and all its forms by organising a symposium focusing on three guiding questions:

1. *What challenges are we facing with child labour in agriculture and food supply chains and how could we address them?*

2. *How can partnerships throughout the whole supply chain make a difference for children and their families?*
3. *How to accelerate action towards the achievement of SDG 8.7? How do we get from where we are now to where we want to be by 2025?*

It is crucial to understand that child labour is both a cause and consequence of poverty, inequality, discrimination, social exclusion, and lack of access to education. Therefore, the EU together with its partners, will aim to:

- identify key challenges and opportunities related to child labour in agriculture and food supply chains;
- highlight best practices and lessons learnt in fighting against child labour;
- reflect on the impact of Covid-19 and its socioeconomic consequences to child labour; and
- raise the visibility of child labour in the broader agenda for agriculture, food security, Covid-19 pandemic, protracted crises and climate change.
