
Modernising Armenia's Border Crossing Points

Three border crossings link Armenia with Georgia: Bagratashen, Bavra, and Gogavan. In a country in which two of its four borders are closed, these crossing points are critical — an estimated 80% of Armenia's trade passes through them, as well as an ever-increasing number of people: in 2008-2012 the figures increased almost threefold, from 3,100 to 8,020 on average per day.

However, in these remote, mountainous areas, the lack of infrastructure for transport and border control makes trade and the movement of people challenging. With the financial support of the European Union and its financial institution the European Investment Bank, the Armenian Government has partnered with UNDP to modernise these three border crossing points to facilitate the movement of people and goods.



The project is part of a programme of the Republic of Armenia aiming to modernise the Armenian border crossing points and involving other financing from the Government of Armenia and its partners.







