On Thursday 6 October the Minister of Basic Education, Mrs Angie Motshekga, together with European Union Ambassador Marcus Cornaro will launch four EU grant-funded projects that are aimed at improving teaching and learning in the areas of Early Childhood Development (ECD), Inclusive Education (IE) and Special Education Needs (SEN).

In response to the need to support the practical implementation of South Africa's positive ECD, IE and SEN education policies, the EU Delegation launched a call for proposals for Civil Society Organisations (CSOs) in September 2015. There is a valuable role for CSOs to support the education system in specific areas based on their experience and knowledge.

Under the overall aim of the Teaching and Learning Development Programme between the EU and South Africa, the objectives and the priorities of the call were agreed with the Department of Higher Education and Training (DHET) and focus on partnering and building capacity within Higher Education Institutions to strengthen the teacher education system, through research, programme and materials development.

Four consortiums have been awarded grants for a total EU support of €3,000,000 (R45,000,000). The EU support totals 80% of the projects' budgets with the CSOs contributing a further 20%.

The overall objective of the collaboration is to introduce a new era of teacher professional development that will effectively respond to Government's vision of a fully inclusive education system by 2021.

About the grant recipients:

The British Council for Teaching for All – Mainstreaming Inclusive Education in South Africa.
