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Improved systems - better results

Supporting system-wide education sector reforms through technical assistance and budget support



Context

The European Union (EU) has been involved with supporting education in Botswana for over 20 years. The main cooperation programme between the EU and Botswana during 2010-2017 is continuing this path with the Human Resource Development Sector Policy Support Programme (HRD SPSP). This makes up 88% of the funds under the 10th European Development Fund.

Objectives

With unemployment high among tertiary education and vocational skill graduates and with the quality of the education system perceived as low in international comparisons, this programme is set to support major system-wide reforms in the education sector. The Education and Training Strategic Sector Plan (ETSSP), the new Botswana Qualifications Authority and the Human Resource Development Council are important reforms supported. Reducing the HIV/AIDS and Child and Maternal Mortality rates are objectives related to the Millennium Development Goals 4, 5 and 6.

Activities

Most of the financial support is released into the Government's Treasury when the involved ministries are making progress annually on commonly agreed areas of reform or targets.

Another form of support is technical expertise provided to the participating ministries in order to build their capacity to undertake reforms to improve service delivery to the citizens. As EU funds are released to the Treasury, public finance management (PFM) system reforms in the Ministry of Finance and Development Planning (MFDP) are also supported.
