INTRODUCTION



“The EU Delegation’s mandate covers **political, economic development and trade relations.**”

The Delegation of the European Union to the Republic of Zambia and COMESA is responsible for managing official relations between the European Union (EU) and Zambia, and with the Common Market for Eastern and Southern Africa (COMESA).

The Delegation employs 50 professionals (approximately 60% are Zambian colleagues) from a wide variety of backgrounds, disciplines and nationalities of the European Union Member States.

The EU Delegation’s mandate covers political, economic development and trade relations. One of its roles is to manage and promote development relations, in accordance with the provisions of the Cotonou Agreement, the Sustainable Development Goals, the European Commission’s ‘New Consensus on Development’ and the New Africa-Europe Alliance for Sustainable Investment and Jobs.

To fulfil its mandate, the EU Delegation draws on the expertise of thematic and country experts in Brussels-based European institutions (e.g. the European Commission and the European External Action Service).

Together with its Member States and other Cooperating Partners in Zambia, the EU works towards better coordination, harmonisation and alignment of its development action based on Zambia’s development priorities and targets.

For the period 2014-2020 (under the 11th European Development Fund) the EU made available €460m grants to support Zambia with the implementation of its priorities and policies in Energy, Agriculture and Governance as established in the 7th National Development Plan.

This very sizable amount of financial resources has been supplemented with other EDF grants (approx. €100m) made available through various facilities and approx. €20m from the EU Budget. Moreover, the European Investment Bank has an ongoing portfolio of loans of approximately €650m.

The EU Delegation also plays an important role through its regional mandate, where it leads EU policy dialogue and supports regional economic integration with the Common Market for Eastern and Southern Africa (COMESA).

WHO ARE WE?

The Delegation of the European Union was opened in 1975 following Zambia’s signing of the first Lomé Convention. Since then, the EU has established a sustained and dynamic partnership with Zambia as one of its long-term partners.

The EU Delegation plays an essential role in providing Zambian counterparts with information on the policies and institutions of the EU. In doing so, the EU Delegation works closely with Member States’ Embassies in Zambia and is fully involved in the coordination of development assistance with the Cooperating Partners represented in Zambia and in political dialogue with the Government of Zambia and COMESA.

The EU is one of the largest development partners in Zambia and a privileged interlocutor for the promotion of investments in the country.

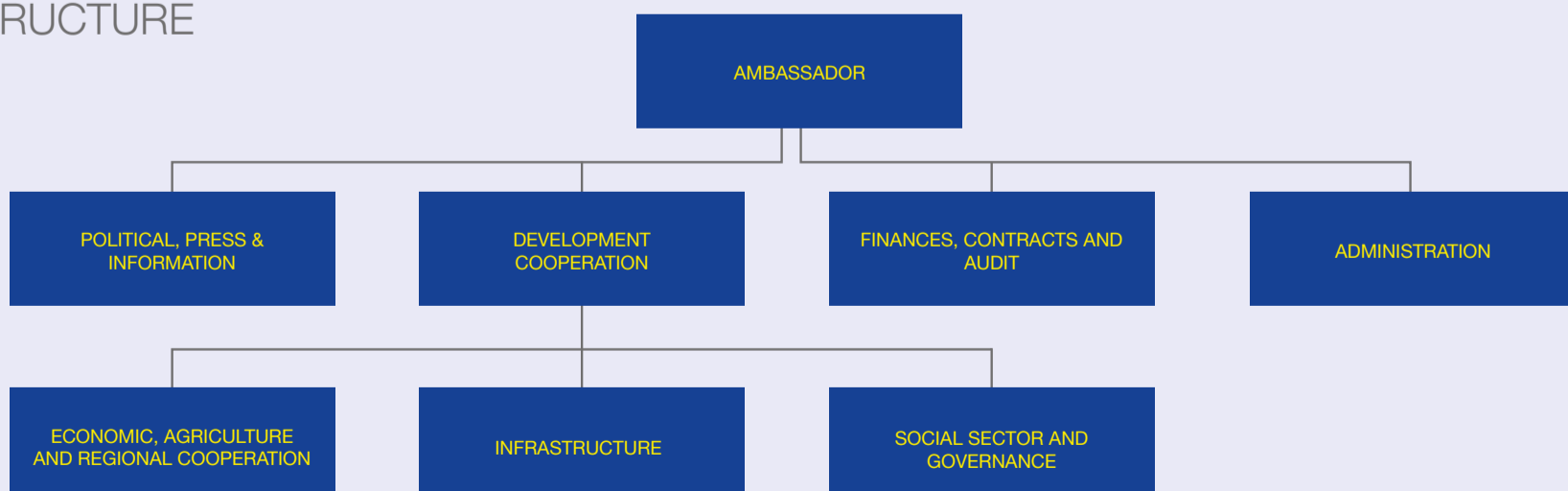
THE STAFF OF THE EU DELEGATION

SUPPORTING ZAMBIA'S LONG-TERM DEVELOPMENT



Based on the principles laid down in the European Commission's new policy framework, EU development assistance for 2014-2020 is focused on two priority areas:

- i. Human rights, democracy and good governance
- ii. Inclusive and sustainable growth.

ENERGY: helping to maintain growth and improve competitiveness through improved access to clean, reliable and affordable energy for all.

AGRICULTURE: continued support to agriculture, aiming to improve the income and nutrition of smallholder households, while promoting environmental sustainability.

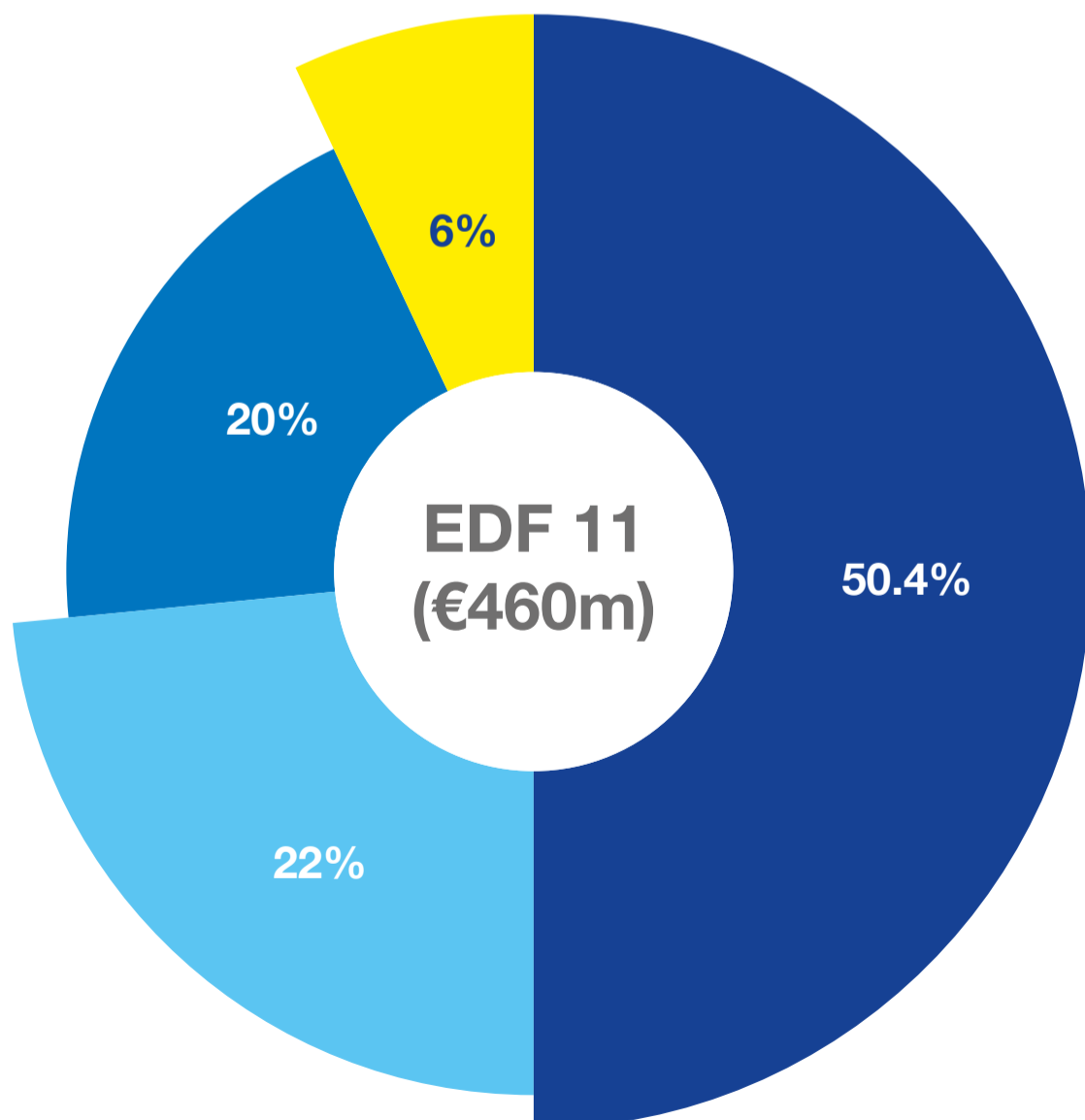
GOVERNANCE: advancing democratic accountability and state effectiveness for all, centred on increasing equality of access to justice, continuing our support to the electoral system and better resource management and service delivery.

The EDF bilateral indicative programme for 2014-2020 was jointly signed on 10th October 2014. EU support to Zambia’s development priorities focuses on three sectors:

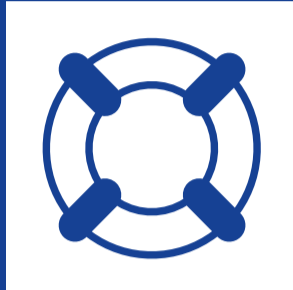
The chart below outlines the sectors supported under the Programme.

SUPPORTING COMESA'S REGIONAL INTEGRATION AGENDA



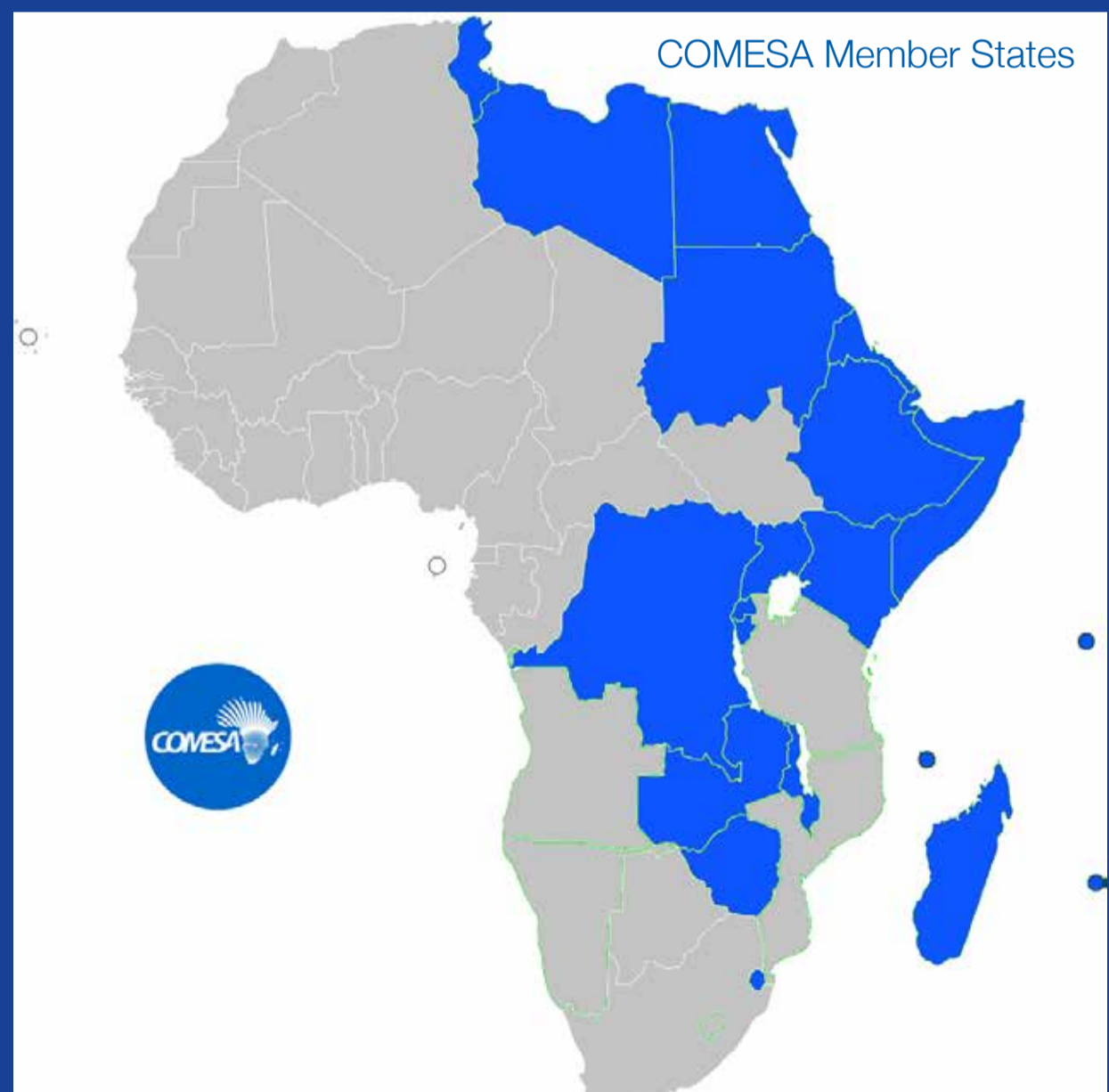
The EU is a key partner of the Common Market for Eastern and Southern Africa (COMESA), a regional economic organisation based in Lusaka whose core mission is to promote regional economic integration and cooperation in the region.

COMESA was established in 1994 with the goal of being a fully integrated, internationally competitive regional economic community with high standards of living for its entire people, ready to merge into an African Economic Community (Article 3 of the COMESA Treaty). COMESA has 21 Member States, with a total population of around 560 million people and a combined GDP of approx. \$770bn. COMESA has an operational Free Trade Area (FTA) since 2000 and is progressively moving towards a Customs Union and a fully-fledged Common Market covering the free movement of services, investments and people. The current Secretary General is Ms Chileshe Kapwepwe from Zambia.

The COMESA-EU partnership has been evolving since the 1990s, shaped by COMESA's needs and priorities. Under the 11th EDF (2014-2020), the EU has allocated a total of €1.5bn (including €600m to finance infrastructure) to support regional economic integration, peace & security and natural resources management in the Eastern Africa – Southern Africa – Indian Ocean (EA – SA – IO) region. €85m of this package will specifically support trade facilitation, the development of regional value chains and Small and Medium-sized Enterprises (SMEs) as well as institutional capacity building in the COMESA region.

PROJECTS IN ZAMBIA

The next pages provide summaries of our main projects currently being implemented at the national level.



MILLENNIUM DEVELOPMENT GOAL INITIATIVE (MDGI) ACCELERATING PROGRESS TOWARDS MATERNAL, NEONATAL AND CHILD MORBIDITY AND MORTALITY REDUCTION IN ZAMBIA (€50M, 2013-2019)

The Millennium Development Goal Initiative (MDGI) aims to accelerate the reduction of maternal, neonatal and child mortality in Zambia. The programme is funded by the European Union with an amount of €50m and implemented by the Zambian Ministry of Health with the technical support of UNICEF and other partners. This programme aims to improve the availability and quality of health and nutrition services in 11 districts in Lusaka and Copperbelt provinces, covering over 30% of the Zambian population. The expected result is an increased availability of a continuum of maternal, neonatal and child health and nutrition services of good quality.

HEALTH SYSTEM STRENGTHENING (HSS) PROGRAMME (€18M, 2013-2019)



The Health Systems Strengthening (HSS) programme aims to enhance the availability and rational use of good quality medicines in Zambia, with the overall objective to improve the health status of the Zambian population. The HSS Programme has four components: (1) Strengthening the regulatory and quality control functions of the Zambian Medicines Regulatory Authority – ZAMRA; (2) Support to Medical Stores Limited – MSL to improve the effectiveness and cost-efficiency of the pharmaceutical procurement and supply management system; (3) Progress towards rational

drug use, and; (4) Technical support to the Ministry of Health for strategic policy developments and implementation. This support includes inter alia the construction along the airport road of the new ZAMRA offices and of a new National Medicines Quality Control Laboratory meeting international quality standards. It also entails the upgrade of the MSL central warehouse facilities in Lusaka, with the aim to increase storage capacity for medicines by 400% and improve processes and efficiency.

REHABILITATION OF THE GREAT EAST ROAD (2012-2018, €45.5M FROM THE EU OUT OF A TOTAL OF €150M)



This major road project is co-financed by the EU together with European Investment Bank (EIB) and the French Development Agency (AFD). The project aims to improve regional connectivity through the improvement of about 360 km of single carriageway highway along the Great East Road connecting central Zambia to its Eastern province, as well as to the Nacala Corridor, a regional transport

corridor linking Malawi and Zambia to the deep water port of Nacala in Mozambique.

Results: Works were completed in November 2018 with two lots receiving final acceptance and handed over to the Government in 2018. The third lot will be handed over in 2019 after a 1-year maintenance period.

SUPPORT TO EFFECTIVENESS AND TRANSPARENCY IN MANAGEMENT OF PUBLIC RESOURCES - EFFECT (€17M, 2018-2023)

In line with the vision of the European Union “Collect more – spend better” intended to reinforce governance, raise the revenue collection and improve the quality of spending, the EU is supporting ZAMBIA by enhancing: (i) the planning, budgeting and management capacities of the Ministry of Finance and selected line ministries (such as Health, Agriculture and Energy); (ii) the efforts of the Zambia Revenue Authority to modernise revenue collection,

expand the tax base and increase compliance; (iii) the capacity of the main oversight institutions (National Audit Office, National Assembly of Zambia and Anti-Corruption Commission) to hold the Executive accountable and ensure transparency of the management of public resources. The support to the National Audit Office and to the Anti-Corruption Commission will be provided via peer Institutions from Member States of the European Union.

PROGRAMME FOR LEGAL EMPOWERMENT AND ENHANCED JUSTICE DELIVERY - PLEED (€7M, 2015-2019)

This project is implemented via GiZ with a co-funding by the German Government of €1.5m. It consists of two components that contribute to (i) strengthen legal empowerment of all people and access to legal assistance in civil and criminal justice cases, and (ii) strengthen policy and institutional frameworks and coordination amongst stakeholders for efficient, effective, fair, transparent and inclusive justice delivery. The first component supports civil

society organisations in three provinces (Lusaka, Southern, and Copperbelt) while the second component supports the Executive, the Legislature and the Judiciary towards sector policy and institutional reforms to further enhance human rights promotion in the justice system. Key expected results are an improved justice service delivery through a better access to legal assistance and a strengthened policy and coordination among public institutions.

KARIBA DAM REHABILITATION PROJECT (€64M, 2015-2020)



The European Union is financing the works required to reshape the plunge pool and to stabilise the foundations of the dam (“Plunge Pool Reshaping Works”). The works started in late 2017 and will continue for four years if no spilling event is needed. As a result, the long-term operation of the dam will be assured and the reliable production of electricity will be maintained for both Zambia

and Zimbabwe (2130 MW in total, of which 1080 MW on the Zambian side of the Zambezi river). The overall rehabilitation project is co-financed with the African Development Bank, the Swedish International Development Agency, the World Bank and the Zambezi River Authority, who contribute financially to the rehabilitation of spill gates which constitutes a parallel component of this complex project.

SUPPORT TO THE ZAMBIA ENERGY SECTOR: INCREASED ACCESS TO ELECTRICITY AND RENEWABLE ENERGY PRODUCTION- IAEREP (€40M, 2016-2024)



This project seeks to support the establishment and promotion of a conducive environment to encourage the enhanced participation of the private sector in delivering access to electricity and clean energy services based on renewable energies in Zambia. More particularly, the project shall support the adjustment of policies and the legal and regulatory framework to streamline procedures for investors and shall enhance capacities of key public actors playing a role in facilitating the market entry. Two long term technical

assistance teams, one to help in improving policies as well as the legal and regulatory framework and another one to support the development of feasibility studies and emergence of innovative business models, have been mobilised. A call for proposals to co-finance a number of demonstration off grid projects to operate under an improved regulatory framework will be launched in 2019. A large capacity building programme for both public and private actors is also underway and will commence in 2019.

CONTRIBUTION TO THE AFRICAN INVESTMENT FACILITY: ELECTRIFI – ZAMBIA WINDOW (€40M, 2017-2024)



In order to scale up access to and promote clean energy services based on renewable energies, the European Union has set up an innovative financial instrument, Electrifi (Electrification Financing Initiative), which from 2019 onwards is also operating in Zambia under the specific Electrifi – Zambia window arrangement. This dedicated EU instrument aims at unlocking additional financing from private investors in order to boost the development of innovative energy services, including the off grid segment of the market. The Zambia window of Electrifi is meant to support primarily the private sector developers-through

loans and other financial tools tailored to the needs of investors – wanting to invest in projects that will contribute to increasing the renewable energy production and access to clean, reliable and affordable energy and in Zambia. In this way, Electrifi will act as a influential lever of inclusive, climate-change resilient growth and competitiveness of the country. It is expected that Electrifi – Zambia window will become operational from early 2019. This programme is complementary to efforts to be supported under the IAEREP programme.

LUSAKA TRANSMISSION DISTRIBUTION REHABILITATION PROJECT (LTDRP) – LOW VOLTAGE DISTRIBUTION NETWORK (€65M, 2017- 2024)

The Project seeks to address the current power network capacity and access affordability challenges within Lusaka city. The project is part of a larger LTDRP programme covering the whole city of Lusaka and aims at improving the low voltage network and providing increased access to clean, reliable and affordable energy services to at least 63,000 subsidised individual customers [households, public institutions and Micro and Small Enterprises (MSEs)] in the pre-selected low income high density areas. In addition, this programme will facilitate access of the beneficiary MSEs and female entrepreneurs to micro-credit lines from local financial institutions and provide some training to

targeted credit beneficiaries on business management/ entrepreneurship to enhance the productive use of electricity and sustainability of their economic activities, as well as improved income and better social living conditions for their immediate families. The total project cost is estimated at €65 million. The services to undertake the engineering design and supervision of the works have been contracted. The grid improvement works and subsidised connections as well as businesses support activities will run in parallel and are foreseen to start in 2020 and be completed in 2022/23.

SEXUAL AND GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE (SGBV) PREVENTION AND SUPPORT PROGRAMME TO SGBV SURVIVORS IN ZAMBIA (€25M, 2018-2023)



The new EU Sexual and Gender Based Violence (SGBV) prevention and response programme will support the Zambian Government in its coordinated response towards SGBV. The programme's first pillar focuses on SGBV prevention by challenging and changing beliefs, attitudes and behaviour through partnership with traditional, religious and political leaders, through age-appropriate comprehensive sexuality education, and through reach-out

to the masses by community radios – to be implemented by BBC Media Action. The programme's second pillar focuses on increasing access and use of comprehensive support services to survivors of SGBV, especially by rolling-out the one-stop SGBV centres to all districts in Luapula and Northern Province. Access to psycho-social counselling will be increased through a grant to Lifeline/ Child Line Zambia.

PROJECTS APPROVED IN 2018-2019

PROJECTS IN ZAMBIA

MAKING AGRICULTURE AN INCLUSIVE PRIVATE SECTOR BUSINESS FOR JOBS AND GROWTH (€99M, 2018-2023)

The European Union's Support to the sustainable commercialisation of Zambia's smallholder farmers programme helps small-scale farmers to graduate from low productivity agriculture towards more sustainable, diversified and market-oriented commercial farming. This will increase farmers' income and improve their food and nutrition security.

The programme promotes new investments and develops the most promising agriculture value chains by facilitating access to finance, services and inputs. It assists entrepreneurial small-scale farmers and fishermen to link up

to private sector enterprises and service providers and be better integrated into value chains and markets. Building on the European Union's long-standing commitment to conservation agriculture the programme promotes sustainable cropping and land management techniques and durable smallholder irrigation systems. Further to its expected impact on dietary diversity, the programme contributes to fighting malnutrition through a contribution to the First 1,000 Most Critical Days Programme.



ENHANCING LOCAL GOVERNMENT CAPACITY FOR DEVELOPMENT PROJECT (€5M, 2018-2021)

The implementation of the Enhancing Local Government Capacity for Development project, funded under the Local Authorities budget line, kicked off in early 2018. The project aims to enhance local governance for effective, efficient and inclusive service delivery and development in 10 districts in Zambia, including developing integrated development plans (IDPs), local economic development (LED) plans, and

supporting capacities at local government level as the GRZ begins implementation of the Devolution Policy. Working closely with the Ministry of Local Government, the project is implemented by the Commonwealth Local Government Forum in partnership with the Local Government Association of Zambia.

SUPPORT TO REFUGEES AND HOST COMMUNITIES IN MANTAPALA SETTLEMENT, ZAMBIA (€1M, 2018-2019)

In 2018, the EU Delegation awarded €1m to the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) for the support to refugees from the Democratic Republic of Congo and host communities at Mantapala Settlement

in Nchelenge District of Luapula Province. The funding is channelled through civil society organisations who will provide substantial support to the people in need in the sectors of education, and water & sanitation.



SUPPORT THE CAMPAIGN TOWARDS THE ABOLITION OF DEATH PENALTY IN ZAMBIA (€100,000)

In 2018, the EU Delegation provided a grant of €100,000 to the Human Rights Commission (HRC) for contributing to a nation-wide campaign against death penalty in Zambia. The campaign aims at increasing public understanding and

raising citizen's awareness against death penalty, torture and other forms of cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment.

NEW PROGRAMMES IN THE PIPELINE:

The European Union and the Government of Zambia are currently preparing three possible new interventions: (i) Support to the 2021 General Elections; (ii) Energy Efficiency Programme; (iii) Programme for Economic Governance.



It is important to mention also the programmes supported by the European Development Bank, which is historically a key development partner to Zambia. The EIB's portfolio covers a wide range of sectors including public infrastructure projects in transport, water, sanitation, and

energy (hydropower/transmission/distribution), as well as private sector projects (lines of credit to banks to support SMEs; lines of credit to MFIs to support micro-enterprises, IPP in the solar energy sector).

REGIONAL PROJECTS

THE COMESA SMALL-SCALE CROSS BORDER TRADE PROGRAMME (€15M, 2018-2022)



The COMESA Small Scale Cross-border Trade Initiative started in May 2018. This initiative aims at supporting “pro-poor” trade facilitation rules, instruments and infrastructure in order to ease formal border crossing for small-scale traders and increase small-scale cross border trade flows at selected border posts in the COMESA region (namely: Chirundu, Mwami/Mchinji, Kasumbalesa, Tunduma/Nakonde and Moyale). Implemented by the COMESA Secretariat in partnership with the International Trade Centre (ITC) and the International Organisation for Migration

(IOM), this regional programme includes (i) support to the implementation of the COMESA simplified trade regime (STR) and other trade facilitation instruments, (ii) the fight against corruption, bribery and harassment at the border (with a focus on women, around 70% of small-scale traders in Africa being women), (iii) improved data collection and monitoring of cross border trade flows, (iv) capacity strengthening of Cross Border Traders Associations (CBTAs) as well as (v) the construction/upgrade of border infrastructure such as border markets and storage facilities.

THE COMESA TRADE FACILITATION PROGRAMME (53M, 2018-2022)



The Trade Facilitation programme will support the upgrading of the existing online monitoring, reporting and resolution system and will offer technical support to Member States for the implementation of the COMESA Non-Tariff Barrier Regulations. In addition, the programme will support the upgrading of five selected border posts in view of the establishment of One-Stop-Border-Posts, namely at: Chirundu (between Zambia and Zimbabwe), Mwami/Mchinji (between Zambia and Malawi), Nakonde

(between Zambia and Tanzania), Moyale (between Kenya and Ethiopia) and at Galafi (between Ethiopia and Djibouti). The programme will also address regional sanitary and phytosanitary challenges, such as aflatoxin limits for maize and maize products and microbiological limits for milk and milk products. Furthermore, it will provide support to trade negotiations, trade promotion in the region, trade in services and free movement of persons.

ENHANCING PRIVATE SECTOR PARTICIPATION IN REGIONAL VALUE CHAINS (€10M, 2019-2023)

The Regional Enterprise, Competitiveness and Access to Markets Programme aims at enhancing competitiveness of the private sector and at increasing access to regional and international markets. The interventions will include provision of market information to the value chain players and fostering the capacity of SMEs through various training in business management. The support will involve the development of a regional market information system which will act as a regional repository for all buyers and sellers of particular products accessible to the private sector.

In addition, the programme will support implementation of measures aimed at enhancing the business and investment environment in the region by advocating for regional and national regulatory frameworks and policies that create a favourable environment for business. The Programme is focused on three value chains: (i) Horticulture; (ii) Leather and Leather products; (iii) Agro processing.

SUPPORTING ZAMBIAN CIVIL SOCIETY

SUPPORT FOR NON-STATE ACTORS

The EU Delegation manages a variety of small projects across a number of sectors and locations in Zambia. They are funded either through the European Instrument for Democracy and Human Rights (EIDHR), or through the EU Development Cooperation Instrument (DCI), and are implemented by a range of international and local NGOs.

As of April 2019, there are 15 ongoing projects in the following sectors: anti-discrimination against marginalised groups, nutrition, citizen engagement in democracy, and re-integration of inmates in correctional facilities

FIGHT AGAINST DISCRIMINATION AND MARGINALISATION (€1.2M, 2018-2022)



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The EU supports five Civil Society Organisations' projects to promote an environment of non-discrimination in Zambia, with a focus on the protection of the rights of people with disabilities and people living with HIV/AIDS.

CAFOD, SOS Children's Village, CeLIM, Zambia Agency for Persons with Disabilities and AIDS-Fondet are implementing the programme in various areas of Zambia.

SCALING UP NUTRITION INTERVENTIONS AT DISTRICT AND COMMUNITY LEVEL (€4M, 2016-2019)



To support the Government of Zambia in addressing under-nutrition through the scale up of a multi-sectoral approach combining Sustainable Agriculture, Health, Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH), the EU Delegation is funding nutrition projects with four civil society organisations (CARE, Save the Children, Village Water, and World Vision).

SUPPORTING CITIZEN ENGAGEMENT IN DEMOCRACY AND RE-INTEGRATION OF INMATES IN CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES IN ZAMBIA (€3.8M, 2018 – 2022)



In order to enhance civil society contributions towards deepening democracy and also promoting inclusive sustainable growth through skills development in favour of incarcerated populations and strengthening community response systems for their reintegration, the EU Delegation awarded in 2018 a total of €3.8m to

six Civil Society Organisations: the Alliance for Community Action (ACA), CELIM, Development Aid from People to People (DAPP), Mansa District Land Alliance (MDLA), Undikumbukire Project Zambia Limited (UP Zambia) and Voluntary Service Organisation (VSO).

EU-CSO ROADMAP FOR ENGAGEMENT WITH CIVIL SOCIETY IN ZAMBIA

Within the framework of the strategic engagement of the EU and its Member States with civil society, the EU Delegation organises activities which are aimed at responding to the priorities set by local civil society organisations. These include trainings on enhancing technical

and financial capacities of CSOs and exchanges on specific topics. The EU Delegation also organises CSO Fairs on an annual basis to assist CSOs in enhancing their Information, Communication and Visibility with the general public.
